



## CAMP NAVAJO For Your Safety

Camp Navajo served as a military ammunition depot for more than 50 years, and continues to be used as a military training facility. As a result of these activities, **live, unexploded or unfired munitions**, along with **explosive or flammable residues** have been found on the installation, especially in the former Demolition Area.

Their disturbance can result in **explosion or fire**, or the release of **smoke or gas**.

These materials can be **extremely dangerous** and **very sensitive**. As you can see from the photo, they may be rusty, partially buried, and hard to recognize. If anything looks at all suspicious, **do not touch, pick up, or kick it**.

If you are hunting in a nearby hunt unit, do not trespass onto Camp Navajo (not only is it unsafe, it's also illegal). If you are hunting on Camp Navajo, stay within your designated area. **Heed our fences and signs. They are there for your safety. Under no circumstances should you chase a wounded animal into an unauthorized area.** Call Camp Navajo for help.

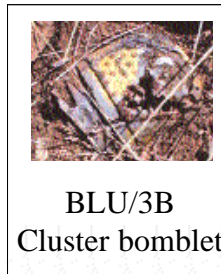

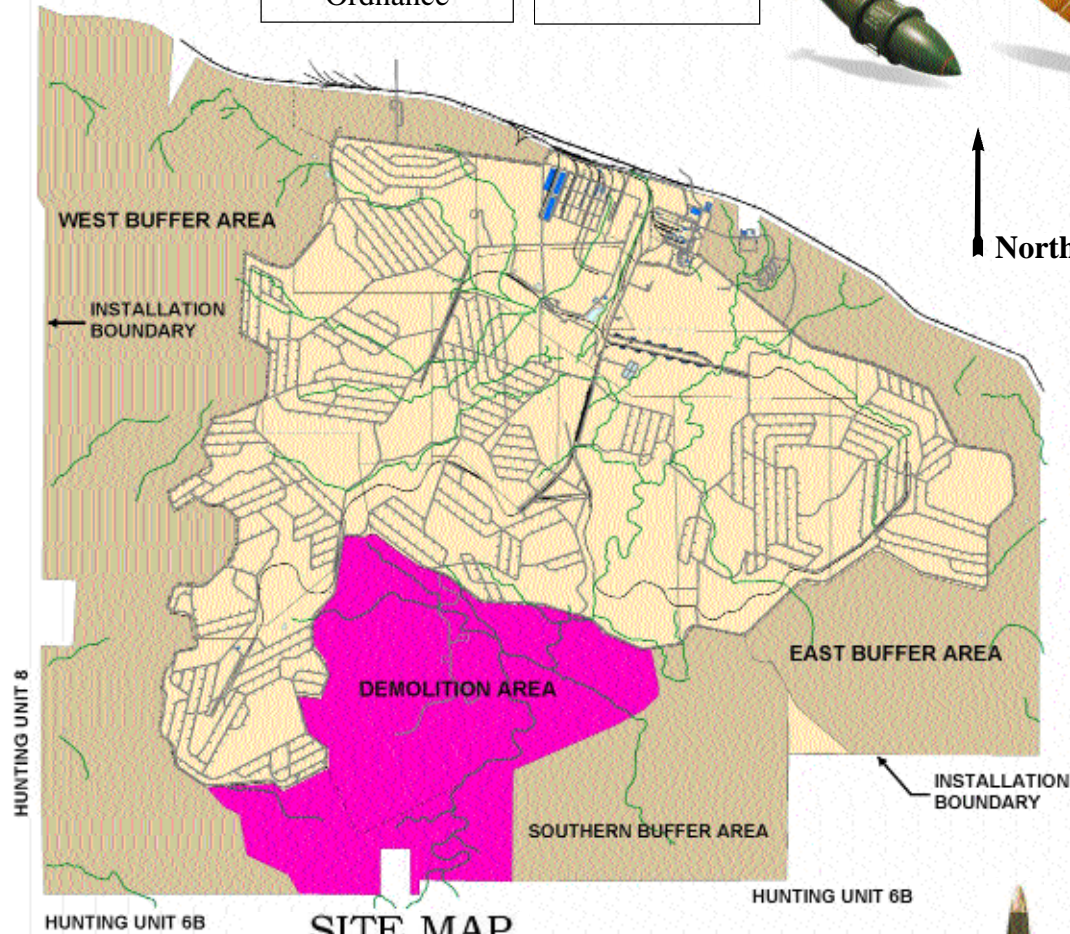
SITE MAP

# UNEXPLODED ORDNANCE CAN INJURE OR KILL

Explosives come in many shapes, sizes and colors. Some are hidden in electronic devices or metal spheres which can be mistaken for toys. Some are bright and shiny and others may be painted or rusted. Flares, found mostly in the Buffer Areas, have the potential of **bursting into an instant ball of flame with temperatures of thousands of degrees**. Any metal objects you encounter may be **dangerous**.

Depending on the type and age of the device, they may be **detonated by movement, pressure, temperature differential, static discharge, etc.** **Never** pick up, kick or otherwise disturb any suspect item. **Never** assume that what you see sticking up out of the ground is harmless.

The National Guard Bureau Environmental Programs Branch is currently partnering with the Arizona National Guard, Arizona Department of Game and Fish, and Arizona Department of Environmental Quality to remove unexploded ordnance at Camp Navajo.
