

# Notice of Availability

## Decision Document for Seven OB/OD Area CERCLA Sites Camp Navajo, Bellemont, Arizona

This notice announces the availability of the Final Decision Document (DD) for Seven Open Burn/Open Detonation (OB/OD) Area Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) Sites. The National Guard Bureau (NGB) makes this decision with the concurrence of the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ). The seven OB/OD Area sites included in this DD are:

- NAAD 01 – Old EOD Demolition Area;
- NAAD 04 – Former CK/CG Demilitarization Area, which includes the former NAAD 44 – Drum Burial Site in Demolition Area;
- NAAD 07 – Closed TNT Retention Ponds;
- NAAD 08A – Former Open Burn Area (Ponds);
- NAAD 09A – Closed Open Burn Area;
- NAAD 10 – Pad #3; and
- NAAD E76 – Potential Mustard Round Burial Site.

The DD presents the selected remedy for the seven OB/OD Area CERCLA sites, chosen in accordance with applicable requirements of CERCLA, as amended by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA) and, to the extent practicable, the National Oil and Hazardous Substances Contingency Plan (NCP). The selected remedy is Site Closure and the Installation Restoration Program (IRP) status is Response Complete. Closure is appropriate because no unacceptable risk to human health or the environment is associated with site-related chemical constituents in soil, sediments, and surface water. In addition, site-related chemical constituents remaining in the soil and sediment are present in sufficiently low concentrations that the potential for infiltration and impact to ground water is insignificant.

Draft DDs for each of these sites were previously prepared and issued for public comment. No comments were received, and no changes were made to the Final DD. This DD has been placed in the Camp Navajo Administrative Record.
